THE VICTORY OF GOD'S GRACE IN JOSEPH

I. Joseph's fiercest fire II. Joseph clear confession

I. JOSEPH'S FIERCEST FIRE

- A. The common misunderstanding of Ch 41: The story of his deliverance!
- B. Joseph's elevation from 'prison to palace' presents greater temptations
 - 1. Consider the main details of his story
 - a. first he is forgotten but finally remembered
 - b. what most impressed the court was not the explanation (33-36)
 - c. through it all, Joseph wasn't shy to confess God (16, 32)
 - 2. Yet his elevation brings a hotter fire he has ever experienced
 - a. he is promoted to serve and daily deal with pagans (37-40)
 - b. he is receiving massive doses of recognition and honor (43-44)
 - c. his name is changed to mask his real identity (45)
 - d. he is united to an utterly pagan wife (45)
- 3. Add up all these details and you must not think 'deliverance' but 'trial'
 - a. be alerted: prosperity kills more than adversity

II. JOSEPH'S CLEAR CONFESSION IS GOD'S VICTORY OF GRACE

- A. Scripture is the 'history of redemption' (see Ps. 105:1-2; 107:8)
- B. What were Joseph's inner thoughts throughout events of ch. 41?
 - 1. The Bible doesn't reveal anything about it until vs. 50-52
 - 2. Naming his children was a personal confession of faith
 - a. at this point he lived longer in Egypt than he outside it
 - b. yet he purposely chose *Hebrew* names for his children
 - 3. Is this grace of God visible in the confession of your/my life?

- C. Joseph confessed his faith in name Manasseh (lit. *forgetting*)
 - 1. what does he confess in this name?
 - a. not that he 'forsook his father's house and faith'
 - b. but that God helped him to move on from the past suffering
 - 2. This is an example of God's healing and victorious grace!
 - 3. Giving his son this curious Hebrew name was an opportunity for him to confess the story of God's grace
 - 4. Do you have a Manasseh in your life?
- D. Joseph goes farther in naming second son Ephraim (lit. *fruitful*)
 - 1. His confession is that God made him fruitful
 - 2. But also that Egypt is (still) the land of my affliction
 - a. picture him surrounded with of all the world's goods available
 - b. yet despite all that still the land of my affliction
 - 3. Do you see your 'world your situation' like that?
 - a. Is your life a 'pilgrimage through the wilderness?'
 - b. Are we like Joseph in our attachment of our surroundings?
