Opening observations

- Main purpose of diagnosis is to lead to healing: same with preaching the law of God
- Reason many ignore God's diagnosis: *unbelief that is about me!*
- Romans 3 contains sharpest diagnosis of all fallen men

#### GOD'S DIAGNOSIS OF NATURAL MAN (1)

I. We miss our purpose II. We are deplorably self-centered III. We are completely unable to change this condition

# I. WE MISS OUR PURPOSE FOR WHICH GOD MADE US

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A. Our purpose of existence is to creatures to reflect God
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- 1. That's why the Catechism begins with holding up God's mirror
- 2. Our chief purpose is summed up in one word: love
  - a. consider 1 Cor. 13:4-7 & Matthew 5:43-48
    - b. apply this standard to *all who are your neighbors*
    - c. what God speaks about love *He speaks about doing* rather than feeling
- B. This brief review indicates *how we miss our supreme purpose* 1. 'Missing the purpose' is one Hebrew word for 'sin'

# II. WE ARE DEPLORABLY SELF-CENTERED - EXPERT SELF-LOVERS

- A. God calls us to 'dig deeper' to expose the under layers of the heart 1. His will is to *love God & love our neighbor as yourself* 
  - According to Mark 12:28-34, love is more important than the observance of all the details to the ceremonial laws!
    a. compare with 1 Cor. 13:1-3

### B. We are to love with every fiber of our being

- 1. Reflect upon this inner reality of *how* we love God and neighbor
  - a. though the *what* isn't unimportant, the *how* is most
    - attitude motive spirit of all actions, reaction and inaction

- C. So let's submit ourselves to a 'cross-examination' with God's law
  - 1. Remember the purpose: *diagnosis to alert us to our condition so we learn to pay heed and value God's given Physician of souls*
  - 2. Cross-examination about the *second table of the law* a. How much do you love yourself?
    - b. Do you love all others as you love yourself?
    - c. What evidences are there to support your claim that you love them all as yourself?
    - d. How consistent to you apply every demand upon others to yourself?
    - e. Is your love to others anywhere near to the love Jesus as Son of man showed to others?
  - 3. Cross-examination about the *first table of the law* a. Do you love God above all?
    - b. Do you love God with 'all of your all? '
    - c. When you pray, is God's honor higher than our needs?
    - d. In all we do, are we more concerned about what God thinks or what man thinks?
    - e. Is it within us as it was in Jesus all the time, "I delight to do Thy will, O Lord?"
- Reflection: Lens of God's Law *brings into sharp focus our sins* in order to make us focus all the more on Christ Jesus, the Lord and Savior.
