The Mystery of the Mediator

Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: but made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men.

Philippians 2:6-7

Christ Jesus, the Son of God, is both God and Man. He is God existing before all worlds; He is Man existing in our world. He is God, because He is God's Word ("the Word was God," John 1:1); He is also man, because the Word, in the oneness of His person, was united with a human body and a human soul. Considering Him as God, He and the Farther are one (John 14:28). When He was already God's unique Son, by nature not by grace, He became the Son of Man, so that He might be filled with God's grace in His humanity. He Himself brings both these natures together in His own single person, and both natures together make one Christ. Being in the form of God, He didn't think it robbery to be what He was by nature, equal with God. But He made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Himself the form of a servant, without giving up or diminishing the form of God (Phil. 2:6-7.

Therefore He was both made less than God, and yet stayed equal with God—both of these in a single person, as I've said. But He was one of these as the Word, and the other as Man. As the Word, He is equal with the Father; as Man, He is less than the Father. He is one Son of God, and at the same time He is Son of Man; He is one Son of Man and at the same time He is the Son of God. He isn't two Sons of God, a divine and human one, but one Son of God. He is God without any beginning in time, Man with a beginning in time—our Lord Jesus Christ.

• Since our bulletin is now digital, I added this beautiful meditation of Luther to your reading for this week instead of a pastoral letter. May God bless us with the anchor of faith, deeply embedded in the Rock of Jesus Christ.

I have said this to you!

"These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." (John 16:33)

"A Christian should emphasize and magnify these words, "I have said this to you" and "I have overcome the world." This is more than heaven and earth. It is as though Christ wanted to say, "My dear friend, write the word "I " with a very large capital letter, in order that you may see it well and take it into your heart. For the word 'you' (in the statements 'I have said this to you' and 'you will have tribulation') is a very small word. Indeed, it is as small as a single speck of dust in the sun. But it does not matter that you are small and weak. I am all the larger and stronger. I created the whole world out of a speck of dust, yes, out of something far smaller than a speck of dust. I created it out of nothing. Accordingly, even if you were still smaller, I can and will make you great enough. For I am the One who is saying this." He does not say, "The emperors and kings of the world are making these statements." This would sound great and glorious before the world. Nor does He say, "All the holy angels from heaven and all creation are making these statements." No, He says, "I, I am making these statements."

This should be and mean more than can be measured and grasped. "Therefore," says Christ, "think only of the statements I am making, and cling to them. Consider the Person saying this, not yourselves, who hear it. And do not consider what is outside Me, that which assails you, etc. For if you want to consider yourselves over against your great enemies — the world, yes, the devil and death — they will become too strong and great for you. Then you will have to despair."

"For almost 6,000 years," say death and the devil, "we have killed and devoured many thousands of them. Yes, we have often destroyed many thousands in a single day. What, then, do we care about one man?" The wolf said, "If I can eat a whole lamb at one time, should I not also be able to swallow a gnat?" The world and the devil regard us as such little gnats that they do not feel it in their jaws when they swallow us.

We, however, should consider neither ourselves as small nor them as great and cruel as it seems. In contrast with death and the devil's might we are small and slight; but if we cling to Him who says, "I, I have overcome the world," we shall see whether all the world, death, and the devil have jaws large enough to swallow us. If they try to swallow us, then a bone will get into their throats the wrong way, and they will choke on it. For just as they have not devoured and consumed Christ, so they will not consume us."
